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Responding to What You Read:

- 1. What part of the story stands out most for you? Write a brief description of that scene or draw a picture of it.
- 2. Is there anything in the story that you didn't understand? Ask a friend or your teacher. Record your question and the answer.
- 3. Can you relate to this story?

Rereading for a Purpose

- 1. Use the plot diagram provided to record the event and important aspects of the story. Don't do this from memory; go back and look at the story to ensure that you are accurate.
- 2. Think about the protagonist. Complete the following chart to show what you know about him/her. Remember a trait is a part of the person's personality. (ex: stubborn, smart, helpful) Proof is evidence from the story like a quote or a description of an event.

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- 3. What do you think the theme is? Remember theme is the message of the story. It can be expressed as a word and then supported with what the writer is saying about that word. (Theme is NOT a cliché one liner like "treat others how you want to be treated.") Record your thoughts on the theme of this story.
